




Youth in Care Ages 14-19: 1,844 (43%)




Youth in Care Ages 16-17: 946 (50% of all 14-19)




Placement Setting


(0-13 Jears VS. 14-10 Jears)




Placement Setting (14-10) Jears VS. 16-17 Jears)




Permanency Objectives (Case Plan Goals)




Entry Age Vs. Aging Out



Jouth's Recommended Edits

National Definition:

Permanence is an enduring family relationship:

- Is *safe* and lasts a *lifetime*
- Offers the *legal rights* and social status of full family membership
- Provides for physical, emotional, social, cognitive and spiritual well-being
- Assures *lifelong connections* to birth and extended family, siblings, other significant adults, <u>friends</u>, family history and traditions, race and ethnic heritage, culture, religion and language

Youth Comments:

- "Not just an enduring *family* relationship, a relationship with significant others might be best"
- "A serious family relationship (bio family)"
- "I think that everybody should be treated equally at all times."

Nebraska Definition:

Permanency is both a process and a result that includes involvement of the youth <u>and family</u> as a participant/leader in finding a permanent connection with <u>at least one</u> as <u>many as possible</u> committed adults who provide:

- Safe, stable and secure parenting relationships
- Unconditional love and commitment. No matter what. Even with mistakes, triumphs, errors, happy times.
- Lifelong support in the context of: reunification, adoption, guardianship and maintaining contact with siblings, <u>relatives</u>, <u>and higher-power</u>.

Youth Comments:

- "Not only a committed, but also a reliable adult"
- "Contact with all family members"
- "Provides for physical, emotional, social, cognitive and spiritual well-being"
- "An adult who listens"
- "Someone who will be there for the rest of your life"
- "A positive role model"
- "Someone who will push you to be better"
- "Someone who supports you in everything and helps you make good decisions"
- "Attention to cultural backgrounds"
- "Youth deserve to be *happy* where they are"



For those out of care, the percentage of young people who have health insurance for physical health.

- With family adult connection: 64.0%
- With non-family adult connection: 60.2%
- With no adult connection: 50.0%

Percentage of young people who report there are enough people they can count on for emotional support or for job/school advice or guidance.

- With family adult connection: 84.5%
- With non-family adult connection: 65.3%
- With no adult connection: 30.1%

For young people out of care, percentage of young people who report that their housing is safe, stable and affordable.

- With family adult connection: 65.3%
- With non-family adult connection: 54.1%
- With no adult connection: 35.4%
